Community scheme is growing places

A nursery aiming to supply 20,000 trees each year – most of them destined for planting in Leicestershire - is to be developed in partnership with the National Forest Company.

Local groups and organisations will be involved in the exciting, communityfocused initiative by helping to collect seeds and grow new trees to plant across Leicestershire and the National Forest.

They will help meet our ambitious plan to plant 700,000 trees - one for every person in the county.

Work on the site in Moira in North West Leicestershire is due to start soon, with phase one of the pioneering project involving establishing access, infrastructure, polytunnels and growing beds.

The nursery will offer opportunities for apprenticeships, volunteering and lifelong skills training and will form part of a wider hub project, including a visitor centre and gateway to the National Forest.

Councillor Blake Pain, cabinet member for the environment and green agenda, said: "Tree and woodland planting is a vital part of our response to the climate change and biodiversity crises.

"Creating our own tree nursery means our 700,000 target can take a huge stride forward, creates a valuable income stream for us and offers invaluable skills and training opportunities."

130,000 trees planted by end of spring

John Everitt, Chief Executive of the National Forest Company, said: "This tree nursery project represents an exciting collaboration between the National Forest Company and Leicestershire County Council, and we look forward to seeing the nursery grow local seeds into healthy trees that will be planted to benefit nature, communities and our wider environment."

Leicestershire is one of the least wooded areas of the country with around six per cent woodland well below the national average of 10 per cent.

Trees and woodlands play an important part in cleaning up the environment, providing clean air, improving soil guality and reducing floodina.

The nursery – which will help to safeguard against national shortages of key species such as oak – is an important part of the race to net zero.

We're making progress by reducing the carbon footprint of food, making homes more energy-efficient and supporting communities - and will soon be generating renewable energy at a solar farm in Ouorn.

We want Leicestershire to be net zero by 2045 - and given the huge challenge ahead, we need a team effort. Read more about our plans on pages 10 and 11.

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Welcome to Leicestershire Matters

Council leader, Nick Rushton, introduces our spring edition

Protecting the vulnerable and hefty investment in the support people depend on – that's what our budget delivers.

Unforeseen global issues such as war in Ukraine and rising energy costs make balancing our books challenging. We've spent a lot of time on it and asking people to pay more has been a tough decision. Not doing so would drastically reduce the money we can spend on social care, fixing roads and other frontline services. Being the lowest funded county compounds this and I'm looking forward to discussing this with the Chancellor, Jeremy Hunt, next month.

Our communities have welcomed guests from Ukraine with open arms. It's only right that we've stepped up to support those forced to flee their war-torn homeland and it was great to meet Ukrainian guests and sponsors when we planted a tree at County Hall last month. We're also helping communities with £1.5m of vital food and energy support as the cost of living bites. We can't control the factors pushing up prices but we can support those who are feeling the impact the most.

Whether it's parkruns, ambitious net zero plans, congestion-busting road schemes, new family hubs, helping to celebrate the King's coronation or boosting skills, we're working hard for our residents. And if you're inspired by Livvy's heart warming story on page 13, and want to help us change lives, take a look at our jobs.

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Scrutiny's spring spotlight

Adult social care, cancer treatment and road accidents are just three of the big items set to be in scrutiny's spotlight.

Through scrutiny, our councillors provide challenge, receive questions and petitions and play an important role in making sure local services are delivering for you.

Over the winter, our councillors have been taking a magnifying glass to our budget and providing challenge. More than half of our 55 councillors are involved in scrutiny issues and this spring and summer, they have a packed agenda.

Our cross-party committees will be focusing on:

• Children and families: Managing the growing demand for special educational needs and disability needs (SEND) support is key. This, plus home education and new plans for one-stop hubs supporting families, will be the focus.

- Health: Concerns about delays to cancer treatment will be a key item.
- Highways and transport: Taking a fine-tooth comb to the latest road casualty figures and looking at plans to reduce the risk of flooding.
- Adults and communities: The Government's planned reform of adult social care, and what it means for residents, will loom large.
- Environment: Members will look at managing trees on highways and disposal of sofas, plus regular monitoring of key performance indicators.
- Scrutiny commission: The commission will take a wider look at SEND from a finance, service and transport perspective, focus on the next Youth Justice Plan and

continue to monitor financial performance.

• **In-depth:** Two five-member panels will be looking closely at future plans for Shire Grants and recycling and household waste sites, before making recommendations to our cabinet.

Scrutiny's role includes:

- Providing challenge including holding our cabinet to account.
- Receiving questions and petitions.
- Monitoring the performance of services.
- Helping develop our budget and key council policies.
- Scrutinising the performance of other public bodies in the area such as the NHS.

Support for vulnerable at heart of budget

Protecting vital public services during tough economic times is prioritised in our budget – including major investment in help that residents depend on.

An extra £57m more for support, including home and residential care, is at the heart of the plan which will also see major capital investment of £509m, service cuts totalling £3m, £59m of efficiency savings and a 4.99 per cent Council Tax increase to ensure the books balance next year.

An extra £1m has been earmarked to offset the impact of service cuts and boost road maintenance, following better than expected Government funding earlier this year – this includes £100,000 to continue rolling out community speed cameras.

The budget, agreed last month, also features an extra £1m to offset the impact of service cuts and support priorities, such as keeping Leicestershire's roads in good condition.

Although councils fared better than expected in the Government's Autumn Statement, the financial outlook remains extremely tough, with our budget gap set to rise to nearly £90m by 2026. Growing service demand is set to increase our costs by £70m, with rising inflation forecast to add another £91m by 2026/27. The National Living Wage increase drives up social care costs significantly and adds another £18m.

Our yearly budget is **£512** million

A 4.99 per cent Council Tax increase from April equates to £1.39 a week for a Band D home and generates £17.7m for front line services.

As the lowest-funded county council, we pride ourselves on doing the best we can

with the money we have.

Our priority is ensuring vulnerable people continue to receive services they depend on, despite soaring year-on-year demand. And that's in line with what you told us in our consultation and is why we're investing £57m more.

And asking our residents to pay more is far from ideal, especially with rising costs of living. With inflation driving up our costs, a Council Tax rise significantly reduces the impact on front line services.

The longer term financial position remains critical. We're pushing forward with our fair funding campaign and looking forward to meeting the Chancellor, Jeremy Hunt, in the spring to press our case."

Rural bus connects with its users

Our Government funded FoxConnect trial scheme is seeing a positive start.

Just four months after launching with £1.3m of Government funding, the flexible FoxConnect minibus transport service has made a positive start to its trial in south west Leicestershire.

Covering 18 villages and serving key destinations including Fosse Park, Magna Park, Enderby Park and Ride as well as Narborough and Hinckley railway stations, FoxConnect has seen more than 5,000 passenger journeys, and the majority of users have given the service a positive rating through the app.

The service runs from 6am until 7.30pm from Monday to Saturday. You can book a journey through the app or on the phone.

and transport, said: "This positive start for FoxConnect bodes well for it to be successful in

the longer term, which should give us more confidence to try similar flexible transport models if more Government funding becomes available."

E-bikes boost pedal power

Our net zero commitment means we're ready to support people to change the way they travel.

E-bikes are becoming increasingly popular for many, including those who want an extra push when riding, and especially for hills and longer rides.

Our Safe and Sustainable Travel Team has been delivering training sessions for county residents who want to learn more about e-bikes, including answering questions, bike maintenance and tips on how to get the most out of riding your electric bike.

More than 300 people have benefited from the training, with each resident receiving a £300 voucher off an e-bike as part of the Government's E-bike Extension Fund.



Digging in to support our growing county

We look at three key projects helping to shape Leicestershire's growing economy and thriving local communities.

North and east Melton Mowbray distributor road



Work on the eagerly anticipated new relief road for north and east Melton is set to get underway very soon. The road will support the creation of much-needed new homes, reduce congestion in Melton Mowbray town centre and surrounding areas and deliver jobs to the area. Advance work on the scheme is underway, with major construction work due to start this spring.

A511 Coalville growth corridor scheme



In the northwest of Leicestershire, a congestionbusting scheme on a stretch of the A511 between Ashby and Coalville has moved a step nearer with planning permission approved for a link road off Bardon Road to a housing development.

The initiative will see major improvements to eight junctions along the A511 and a dual carriageway between Thornborough Road and Whitwick Road.

After suffering from congestion for many years, the scheme will improve traffic flow and public transport and encourage walking and cycling. Work is set to start in late 2024.

Hollycroft Primary School, Hinckley



marks the start of work

In Hinckley, work has started on a brand-new primary school next to a new housing development on the western edge of the town.

The £8.5m Hollycroft Primary School will have up to 210 pupils and will be funded mostly by the neighbouring housing developer, Bloor Homes.

It will be the first carbon neutral school in Leicestershire, with an 'A' energy rating.

Councillor Ozzy O'Shea, cabinet member for highways and transport, said "We are very excited to see both of these significant transport schemes begin, and we will be working with our contractors to maximise any opportunities for more environmentally friendly work practices on these projects."

Supporting Ukraine

We've marked one year since the first Ukrainian guests started arriving in Leicestershire.

More than 500 households have opened up their homes to guests from Ukraine in the last year, providing a safe, welcoming environment for people fleeing the Russian invasion.

Ukrainian guests have been getting involved in their local communities. Whether supporting other guests in the county, volunteering or finding employment to support the scheme, the near 1,000 guests, who include more than 350 children, have been an inspiration.

Since Homes for Ukraine started, we have worked hard to support sponsor families, including teaming up with partner authorities in the county and increasing the payment for hosts from £350 to £500 over the winter.

Our staff have also worked hard to put in the help needed for the necessary checks and the welcoming of guests.

Myroslava and her son came to the UK last year and lived in Barwell with her hosts Michael and Mandy.

Myroslava said: "Our sponsors became my other parents. We lived with sponsors for about five months, shared good and bad, every step in a foreign country, processing all documents, school, hospital, bank, and much more.

"I found a job in Hinckley and we decided to move as it was easier for us to get to work and school. Again, all the necessary help with finding housing, processing all the documents with the local council and real estate agency, help with furniture and moving - all this was helped by the sponsors.

"In the local church we had the opportunity to meet Ukrainians, learn and practice English. Many Ukrainians and I personally went to college, gaining knowledge in various fields.

"I don't know how our life will turn out in the future, but I have to say that England is a wonderful and beautiful country, and the English are kind, sympathetic and pleasant people. We and our children are safe here and I am personally sincerely grateful to God and this nation for the kindness and humanity shown to all of us Ukrainians."

Wrongly disposing of batteries can cause a serious risk for your bin crews, waste management centres and at household waste and recycling sites. If some types of battery are damaged when processed, they can ignite or explode.

You can make a difference disposing of batteries properly helps to reduce this risk to waste staff and stops those that can be recycled ending up in landfill.

Top tips to make a difference:

- Don't put batteries in your general waste or recycling bins.
- Take it out remove any batteries from old or broken devices.

Nottingham Street in the heart of Melton Mowbray saw local celebrations in 1911 for the coronation of King George V. Crowds of onlookers lined the streets with police officers escorting the walkers for the parade, which took place on 22 June.

Family hubs to bolster support

We've been awarded nearly £1m from the Government to create 'one-stop shops' where parents and carers can access family advice and support services.

They will be a mixture of physical and virtual spaces, where people can access a range of guidance on issues such as social care, education, debt management, and mental and physical health.

Councillor Deborah Taylor, cabinet member for children and families, said: "We are delighted to receive this funding. The family hubs, whether in a building or accessed digitally, will be places where information, advice and support can be easily found in one place."

The physical hubs will be in existing buildings such as libraries and children and family wellbeing centres, where staff will be specially trained to offer and signpost to the right support.

"I have emotionally unstable personality disorder and autism, so I love routines. I may have scars, but now I see them as a reminder of how far I've come on my journey."

Livvy is now "happy, healthy and living my best life."

Over two years, Livvy's incredible determination has seen her complete a learning programme and the Prince's Trust 12-week programme. If that wasn't enough, she has also completed youth offender training and can now mentor. She is also aiming to complete a level three qualification in health and social care to achieve the goal of becoming a mental health nurse.

Rogue builders cost customers thousands of pounds – make sure you're in the know to avoid being a victim.

The all-too-familiar story of rogue builders is one we have all read and heard about. From shoddy work, aggressive tactics or simply never turning up to carry out the work after receiving large amounts of cash, the effect on victims can be devastating.

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Financial and emotional distress and needing to put right the terrible work of a rogue builder are just some of the consequences.

Our trading standards team recently prosecuted a rogue builder in the county and they are now highlighting the simple steps that can help prevent you becoming a victim of rogue builders.

Our Trading Standards team's **top tips**



Door knock? Be alert - Anyone knocking on your door to offer their building services should be an instant red flag. We advise you not to deal with them.



Read, read, read – A reputable trader will have online reviews and recommendations to help you make your decision.



Give yourself choice – Get quotes from at least three different traders to check the market.



Get it in writing – The work taking place, quoted and agreed final price should all be in writing.



Pay securely, leave a paper trail – It's a lot better to pay by bank transfer or credit card rather than in cash.



Pressure is a red flag – Don't feel pressured into paying all money up front before work starts.



Get a second opinion – Speak to friends or family before handing any money over if you're unsure about anything.

Remember – it's better to take your time for a building project than commit to something you aren't sure about.



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
