

Rogue Traders on your doorstep?

During these winter months and associated bad weather, don't be taken in by rogue traders alarming you into having urgent repairs to your property.

They may tell you they have seen loose tiles on your roof, which may not be true as they often use scare tactics to get you to agree to work there and then. Rogue Traders usually start at a low quote which soon becomes a higher quote when they suddenly tell you the whole roof needs replacing, when in fact this is not the case.

Cold calling is not illegal — but aggressive or misleading behaviour is. Here's how to stay safe:

- Don't feel pressured you're under no obligation to listen or buy anything. It's OK to say no and close the door.
- Display a 'No Cold Callers' sign many reputable businesses will respect this.
- Don't hand over money on the spot always take time to think, check credentials, and get at least three quotes.
- Know your rights if you buy something on the doorstep, you may have a 14-day cancellation period.
- If a trader won't leave when asked, or behaves aggressively, call 101 or 999 in an emergency.

Eating out over Christmas & New Year?

Christmas and New Year are times of celebration for many with family, friends and food playing a big part of the festivities. However, eating out can be a worrying time for those with food allergies.

- Here are our top tips to ensure a safe celebration:
- If you have an allergy, it is important that you make the business aware so that they can ensure the food they serve you is safe.
- Do not rely only on the information on the menu but speak to the business as well to confirm the information.



- Ask to see ingredient packaging if you are not confident in the verbal information given.
- If unsure, ask food businesses are legally required to provide information about what is in the food they sell so you can make an informed and safe choice.

- Be aware that cross contamination can happen in busy kitchens and some dishes may be at a greater risk of this due to preparation and cooking methods. Always speak to the business about your specific requirements.
- Suppliers, recipes, and ingredients can change. If you have purchased food before at, or from, a premises, do not assume it will always be the same.

Electric blanket safety this winter

Now we are in Winter, and temperatures have dropped, we know many Leicestershire residents are buying a new electric blanket or have taken an old one out of storage. Before you put it on your bed, please follow these safety tips:

- When looking to buy an electric blanket it is important to buy from a reputable retailer. The blanket must have either a CE or UKCA safety mark.
- Don't ever buy a second-hand electric blanket.
- Before using the blanket, read and follow the manufacturer's instructions. Do not use electric under blankets on top of the bed covers.
- Check the blanket frequently for detached tie tapes, frayed edges, scorch marks, and loose electrical connections.
- Never use a hot water bottle in the same bed as an electric blanket, even if the blanket is switched off.
- Unplug blankets before you get into bed unless they have a thermostat control for safe all-night use.
- ♣ When storing an electric blanket, don't fold it as this may damage the internal wiring. Store flat or rolled up.
- Get your blanket tested by a qualified electrician at least every three years.



If your blanket is more than 10 years old, you should consider disposing of it and buying a new one. Blankets being disposed should be taken to a recycling facility which accepts electric and electronic appliances.

Illegal tobacco seized in Oadby

Jetting off for some Winter sun?

Planning on getting some winter sun? Don't Let Scammers Tag Along!

Winter holidays are a great time to unwind, but they're also prime time for holiday scams. Fraudsters know people are rushing to book and use that urgency to trick you.



Here's how they do it:

- Solution Fake listings for holiday cottages that don't exist
- Invalid tickets to popular events or attractions
- O "Discounted flights" that disappear once you've paid.

Here are some top tips to stay safe when booking your break:

- Use trusted travel companies and booking platforms check they're ABTA or ATOL protected
- Pay with a credit card it gives you extra protection if something goes wrong
- Read reviews on independent sites don't rely only on testimonials shown on the booking page
- Be wary of deals that seem too good to be true they often are.

New member of the family?

Have you witnessed underage sales?

 Vapes containing nicotine are not allowed to be sold to people aged under
 18. It is also illegal for adults to buy vapes to give to people under 18.

- Whilst we find joy in welcoming the New Year in with colourful firework displays, local wildlife and livestock may not.
- If you have livestock in your close surrounding area, consider letting their keeper know so they can be prepared.
- ⚠ Where possible, direct fireworks away from livestock fields as debris can cause harm to livestock or become a choking hazard.

Staying safe with food

Part of the role as a Trading Standards Food Officer is to investigate complaints received from the public.

- They can be found in toys, remote controls, car keys, musical greetings cards, and small electronic devices such as calculators and weighing scales.
- A child needs urgent medical attention if they have swallowed a button battery.

Watch out for this car park QR code scam

Did you know scammers can place fake QR codes in car parks?

This can lead drivers to share their personal and financial information on scam websites



It's important you look out for frauds and be #ScamAware

- Check if the QR code is in an unusual place
 professionally printed, often it can be a
 sticker above another QR code
- ✓ Ensure you're using a legitimate website look at the URL and see if it matches the name of the parking facility
- See if the car park has an official app or website so you can pay in alternative ways.

What would you put on your skin?

Would you buy and use lotion in a tube, and use it on your skin, if there were no labelling and no information about what it contained, or even a product name?

This tube was part of a consignment of cosmetics imported for sale by a business in the UK. It may contain tattoo numbing cream but then again it may not!

All labels on cosmetic products sold in the UK should include ingredients, warnings, and a UK address.

Keep up to date with the latest food safety recalls

Mould you know if a food product you bought was recalled? Could it be something you have in your cupboard or fridge?

A recall is when unsafe food is removed from the supply chain and consumers are advised to take appropriate action, for example to return or dispose of the unsafe food.



There are many reasons why a food product might be recalled, including a risk of food poisoning, problems identified with the manufacturing process, or labelling errors such as incorrect or missing allergen information.

Buying in the winter sales? Know your rights!

Planning on shopping in the winter sales? A lower price doesn't mean fewer rights.

If you buy a product in the sales and it's faulty:

- You have 30 days to return it for a full refund
- After 30 days, you may still be entitled to a repair or replacement
- Discounts don't affect your rights sale or not, the law is the same.



Shopping Winter sales deals online? Here's how to protect yourself:

- P Check the website look for real contact details and reviews
- Pay securely credit cards often give you extra protection.

Watch for red flags:

- Prices that look too good to be true
- Spelling errors and poor website design
- Sellers asking for bank transfers only.
