Duty to Cooperate Report



1.0 Duty to Cooperate

- 1.1 The duty to cooperate was brought into being by Section 110 of the Localism Act 2011. The Section requires County Councils (as well as other bodies) to engage constructively, actively and on an ongoing basis and to have regard to relevant activities of other bodies on strategic matters in the preparation of their Local Plans. The bodies set out by the Localism Act 2011 that are subject to the duty to cooperate are:
 - the Environment Agency
 - the Historic Buildings and Monuments Commission for England (known as English Heritage)
 - Natural England
 - the Mayor of London
 - the Civil Aviation Authority
 - the Homes and Communities Agency
 - each clinical commissioning group established under section 14D of the National Health Service Act 2006
 - the National Health Service Commissioning Board
 - the Office of Rail Regulation
 - Transport for London
 - each Integrated Transport Authority
 - each highway authority within the meaning of section 1 of the Highways Act 1980 (including the Secretary of State, where the Secretary of State is the highways authority)
 - the Marine Management Organisation.

Planning authorities also have a duty to cooperate with Local Enterprise Partnerships and Local Nature Partnerships.



- 1.2 Of the bodies set out in paragraph 1.1 all of those set out below were consulted as part of the issues consultation which began on 22nd November 2013:
 - Environment Agency
 - English Heritage
 - Natural England
 - Civil Aviation Authority
 - Homes and Communities Agency
 - each clinical commissioning group established under section 14D of the National Health Service Act 2006
 - the National Health Service Commissioning Board
 - the Office of Rail Regulation
 - highway authority
 - Local Enterprise Partnership
 - Local Nature Partnership.
- 1.3 As part of the issues consultation waste planning authorities which received or exported significant amounts of waste from and to Leicestershire were contacted. Significant amounts of waste was set at 5,000tpa (tonnes per annum) for non-hazardous waste and 250tpa for hazardous waste going in to a single waste facility in a single calendar year; identified from the Environment Agency's waste data interrogator. Table 1 in the Appendix sets out those authorities that were contacted, what type of significant waste movements had taken place, and the date of any responses received. Responses received are presented in the County Council's Consultation Statement which accompanies this report as part of the evidence base for the current consultation. In brief terms, no authority identified a problem with the identified movements or the approaches presented.
- 1.4 Since the production of the issues consultation document newer data from the Environment Agency became available (the environmental permit returns from 2012). Analysis of the data showed that some additional sites met the significant thresholds for waste movements. Therefore, correspondence was sent in late 2014 to those waste planning authorities which had not replied to the November 2013 consultation and to those where the Environment



Agency's 2012 data showed a new waste facility had been used. Table 2 of the Appendix shows which waste planning authorities correspondence was sent to and Table 3 a summary of the responses received both as a result of the issues consultation and the 2014 correspondence; none of the responses have raised any matters of concern.

- 1.5 In the light of some waste planning authorities not responding to the issues consultation and the correspondence sent in 2014 Leicestershire County Council has undertaken its own analysis of the planning status of the sites identified as receiving significant amounts of waste from Leicestershire. The results of this are presented in Table 4 of the Appendix which shows that two facilities are temporary, the landfills in North Lincolnshire and Warwickshire due to close towards the end of the emerging Local Plan and beyond its timescales, respectively. The only waste planning authority not present either in Table 3 or Table 4 is that of Reading; Reading is not a significant receiver of Leicestershire's waste but a significant exported of hazardous waste to the De-Pack site, near Burton on the Wolds which has a permanent permission and no restrictions on waste sources. It is worth noting that even at the thresholds of significance chosen some authorities, through a lack of response, appear not to consider the identified movements to have strategic implications.
- 1.6 Beyond the correspondence on waste movements, in late 2014 the County Council contacted a small number of bodies to seek their views on specific text of the plan drafted in light of their comments made on the issues consultation. Correspondence was sent to Anglian Water, Coal Authority, English Heritage, Environment Agency, Highway Authority, Natural England, Severn Trent Water. With the exception of Anglian Water responses were received further assisting the Authority in producing the draft Local Plan.
- 1.7 Beyond the formal correspondence between other mineral & waste planning authorities and Leicestershire County Council there have been other undertakings which relate to the duty to cooperate. The County Council has been (prior to the duty to co-operate's creation) and continues to be an active member of a number of forums attended by other waste planning authorities, Leicestershire's district councils and adjoining district councils in which cross border issues are discussed. These forums include, but are not exclusively, East Midlands Aggregates Working Party, East Midlands Strategic Waste Advisory Group, Leicestershire Development Plans Forum; and National Forest Planning and Technical Working Group. (Tables 1-4) summarise the roles of the four afore mentioned groups and any specific matters that are worthy of note from the meetings.
