Dear Susan,

Footpath through churchyard at Thorpe Satchville.

It has come to the attention of the Leicestershire Footpath Association the route walked through the churchyard at Thorpe Satchville is not recorded as a public right of way in the Definitive Map of the Rights of Way for the County of Leicestershire.

The route through the churchyard has been walked for many years and was included when our Association devised the "Leicestershire Round" which is a recreational footpath of approximately one hundred miles linking places of interest within the County. I attach a map indicating by a pink line the section of footpath claimed.

The committee of the Leicestershire Footpath Association is now making an official application to the Leicestershire County Council, for the inclusion of this footpath on the Definitive Map. If Successful, then this will regulise the situation and preserve access in perpetuity.

I have to give you notice of this application to comply with the guidance notes sent to me by the County Council. I expect you will be consulted in due course concerning this matter by Officers of the County Council.



29. Ashby Folville — Thorpe Satchville — Burrough Hill (4 miles)

If you are not going into Ashby Folville, cross Highfields End, and go through the five-barred gate. Cross the field, with a hedge on your left at first, and then passing two protruding hedge corners to your right, cross a fence in the top right hand corner of the field (A).

If you walk through the village, follow the main village road from the Carington Arms, past the very fine 14th century church, and the manor house. To rejoin our path, turn left just after the phone box and, keeping the hedge on your left, go along a gulley and over a fence. When you are in the open field, bear right up the hill and go over a fence near the corner into a large field (A).

Both routes now continue eastward across the field to the metal gate. Continue across the next field, over a farm track, with a spinney in the middle of the field to your left, and a large number of tall streamside trees to your right. Go through a gap into the next field (crossed by pylon lines), keeping close to the stream on your right, with a metal gate at the end, in the corner (B).

Continue across this field to a concrete footbridge which may be a little overgrown. Now make for the top left-hand corner of the next field, and cross the fence into the field on the left. Go across the corner, and over another fence (C) into a field which has a disused railway embankment at the far end. Go under the railway line through a gate, then across the corner of the next field, through a wooden gate, and go uphill towards a barn and Thorpe Satchville. Keep to the right of the barn, and follow the hedge round, through one gate, until you reach another gate which leads into the churchyard, and the tiny St. Michael's church. Turn right into Church Lane leading to the Melton Mowbray — Market Harborough road, which runs through the village. Cross over this road and follow Baker Lane for about a mile.

After about a mile, the lane makes a very sharp left turn, but your path turns off to the right, through a gateway and down a quite steep hill on a well-marked track to a gate, (D) and between some trees to meet a country lane. Cross the lane, and follow the track to a gate. Then, keeping the hedge on your left, make the short climb up to Burrough Hill, the site of an Iron Age Hill Fort. The track you have followed to the Hill is known as "Salter's Road", one of several ancient Iron Age trackways radiating from Burrough Hill.
