1 What is new or changed in this policy? What has changed and why?

The Children and Family Services Department (C&FS) has led on a strategic review for consolidation of voluntary sector support, which is required to determine the future commissioning options regarding service provision for children, young people and their families. This is to ensure delivery against the discrete savings target of at least £800k for Children and Family Services as set out in the Medium Term Financial Strategy (MTFS), 2014-2018, and further savings that are incorporated into the Children and Family Services transformation projects. The current overall departmental spend on children and family services through the Voluntary and Community sector (VCS) is £3,254,510

The Cabinet Report on the 19-September-2014 noted the interdependencies between this report and other County Council actions currently under way with the voluntary and community sector; Cabinet agreed to consultation with the VCS for 10 weeks from 22nd September to 30th November 2014 and to receive a further report regarding consultation outcomes and savings options at its meeting on 11th December 2014.

The 128 current contracts and agreements with 71 VCS organisations are mainly due to expire on the 31st March 2015, with some exception including 7 Housing Related support contracts, which are due to expire on the 30th September 2015. There is a need to be more efficient in the way that service commissioning is organised in order to reduce the cost of bureaucracy and duplication.

The commissioning framework for children, young people and families is underpinned by a vision that:

Leicestershire is the best place for children, young people and their families;

and is articulated through the departmental mission that:

Children and young people in Leicestershire are safe and can live in families where they can achieve their potential and have their health, wellbeing and life chances improved within thriving communities

To support the transformation required to support this vision and mission statement there are 4 major transformation projects that, in addition to the discrete VCS saving of £800k, will require savings from other current VCS arrangements:

- Remodelling children's social care:
- Remodelling early help services
- Remodelling special educational needs and disability services;
- Remodelling education.

The Children and Family Services Departments commissioning strategies to deliver the changes required are in development and will inform specifications for future provision. It is recommended that some services will continue to be commissioned from the VCS because they provide a specialist and unique expertise that cannot be met through direct County Council service provision. Where services meet strategic priorities and this is mutually agreed some contracts will be extended beyond March 2015 to ensure that appropriate transition arrangements are put in place whilst services are recommissioned.

The focus of this EHRIA is the review process and it has been completed and up-dated following commencement of the consultation. Its purpose is to highlight potential impacts arising from the review. It is recognised that although we identify potential impact this stage there is not yet enough specific information available to complete section 3 of an assessment report. Prior to final decisions being made and following further appraisal and consultation, full EHRIAs (including section 3) will be completed and included in a final report to Cabinet in January 2015.

The Children and Family Services Department has completed a number of engagement and consultation events to seek the views of all stakeholders to identify risks, opportunities and impact in order to adopt a more strategic approach to the commissioning of services across the VCS, with a reduction in funding.

The review is part of a wider approach to transforming services across the department and the County Council as a whole. It is wholly connected with a range of partner organisations and other stakeholders. It is nationally relevant to the need to implement the requirements of the Children and Family Act 2014.

Based on current legislative requirements the department will continue to ensure that:

- children are safeguarded and the appropriate services are made available to them;
- early help is targeted to children and their families to prevent problems from worsening;
- schools and other learning providers, including early years providers, are supported and challenged to ensure that the attainment gap closes and achievement is raised at all levels;
- A single point of access ensures a single assessment of needs that can inform service delivery.

The department's strategic approach is to:

- Move from control to influence and promote independence (promoting, enabling and influencing more autonomous communities);
- Collaborate through partnerships and integrate locality based services;
- Provide proportionate response and support the right help at the right time;
- Secure a commissioning approach through effective needs analysis, evidence based service planning, robust performance management and quality assurance; and regular review.

Work has started to redesign existing services within the department, linked to the County Council's Strategic Plan, the transformation programme and other relevant strategies for example the County Council's Communities Strategy and Better Care Together.

Who are the people/ groups (target groups) affected and what is the intended change or outcome for them?

The VCS strategic review and future commissioning options has the potential to impact upon children and young people aged 0 to 18 (up to 25 with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities and up to 21 years if a Care leaver) and their families, living in Leicestershire.

However, specifically, the voluntary sector services that are currently commissioned, support a range of people and groups across Leicestershire, that include the following:

- Young people aged 13-18 receiving youth services (including educational, counselling/mentoring /activities)
- Children under 5 and parent/carers accessing Children's Centres (including parenting support for domestic abuse, debt advice and early learning)
- Disabled children and young people aged 0-25
- Young Carers
- 16 and 17 year olds in need of housing (including care leavers)

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- Children and young people that require therapeutic support.
- Children, young people and parent carers that require mental health support

The intended change and outcome is to re-align and consolidate services to be delivered as part of a future commissioning framework and commissioning plans. This is based upon consultation and engagement, a needs analysis, strategic fit with priorities and affordability.

In order to ensure a transparent and equitable approach to decision making for continued funding an assessment tool has been developed and applied to all of the identified contracts. This will be able to determine the strategic fit of existing provision and provided a risk assessment of the impact of terminating contracts.

The VCS review will lead to specific commissioning or de-commissioning options for the different service groups identified above

Age	X		Children and young people (CYP) aged 0 to 18 years may be

affected by changes in service delivery, within re-commissioning plans following the review. Current services range from being targeted specifically at vulnerable CYP for example teenage counselling within the youth service or homeless accommodation and support for 16/17 year olds (up to 21 if a Care leaver), while others very much focus upon working directly with families and parent/carers to improve outcomes for CYP. It is acknowledged that a reduction in funding for VCS services may impact upon the range of CYP between the ages of 0 to 18 years, however those CYP deemed to be most vulnerable will continue to be identified within strategic priorities for re-commissioning. Children and Young People will continue to be able to have opportunities to access alternative universal service provision within their localities to mitigate service changes. The consultation identified other mitigating factors including the need to embed person centre approaches based upon a family model of delivery with increased community involvement. However it is possible that that the impact of the VCS review will affect specific groups For other groups there will be a positive impact due to legislative changes e.g. The Care Act 2014 and Children and Family Act 2014 make specific reference to 'young carers' for the first time in English legislation. The consultation undertaken so far has identified a need to focus upon specific vulnerable groups and any potential impact of changes in service delivery on some groups in relation to their age, including very young children, young vulnerable people that require accommodation, and those at risk of anti-social behaviour and care leavers
