1 What is new or changed in this policy? What has changed and why?

The Target Operating Model (TOM) for Older Adults is to focus on increasing a citizen's independence to remain living in the community. The focus area is looking to ensure the ideal package of care is commissioned first time to reduce the number of residential placements. There is also a focus on reducing the average spend on a package of care in line with the care act 2014 and Leicestershire County Council's (LCC) strategy. *Prevent, reduce, delay and meet need* 

During the design phase, work has been undertaken to identifying the blockers that potentially prevent a person with high level support needs remaining at home with the ideal package of care.

This has been facilitated by implementing group supervisions with a focus on challenging the commissioning practice of staff along with sharing practice, knowledge and experience between the team members. These meetings have also been a forum for staff to further explore asset-based care in the community.

Positive engagement with external stake holders and other departments within LCC has also taken place to look at and enhance service provision and collaborative working
