We are ambitious for our children and young people and are developing and leading services that will make a difference to their outcomes

The Strategy acknowledges the need to co-invest, co-produce and co-deliver services with Partner organisations to optimise outcomes for young people and ensure efficiencies in costs are achieved where possible.

The Care Placement Strategy offers an understanding of other CFS Strategies and ensures a "golden thread", identifying the overall pathway of services that vulnerable young people may require as well as ensuring that all services are focused on outcomes, prevention and permanence.
