1 What is new or changed in the policy? What has changed and why?

WTS@LCC requires a provider to deliver a wraparound therapeutic support service for a specific group of children and young people who are deemed as being looked after children by Leicestershire County Council. This wraparound therapeutic service for children and young people aged between 8 -18 year old will deliver improved outcomes for children and young people by moving them from residential care to family based living ideally in Leicestershire or by preventing them moving into residential care.

The service will work with two groups of children & young people.

- Firstly a designated group of children and young people with complex needs who present with such significant challenging and risk-taking behaviour that their placement stability is considerably and regularly threatened.
- Secondly it will be required to work with children and young people who are on the edge or risk of admission to care or moving from fostering to residential care.

Extensive research and evidence shows that local area - family based living usually delivers better outcomes in a range of areas including socially, educationally and health and it is an LCC objective that as many children as possible should have that opportunity.

The Reducing Cost Demand in Social Care Outline Business Case (OBC), which was approved in July 2017, established three main strategies for reducing cost in Children's Social Care. These were:

- Prevent: Identify those looked after children (LAC) whose needs are most at risk of escalating and deploy strategies to stabilise their current placements and prevent the need for residential care.
- Intervene: Seek to put in place strategies, support and interventions to enable children and young people, for whom it is appropriate, to step down from high cost placements to family-based provision, improving their outcomes and reducing cost.
- Buy Better: Examine ways by which services and placements can be more efficiently commissioned to realise volume savings.
- The OBC set out that at the heart of all projects and strategies deployed in this area, there will be a core focus on ensuring the right place for the right child and ensuring the best possible outcomes are achieved for Leicestershire's Children and
