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New SEND schools open their doors

Plans to develop local provision for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are well underway - with new schools and units in mainstream schools opening this autumn. Foxfields school, built on the site of the old Oakfield Short Stay School in Blaby, has opened after October half term and will create 50 new places for pupils with social, emotional and mental health needs (SEMH). A new 80-place communication and interaction school in Barwell, Fusion Academy, is also due to open in October.

A number of new resources in mainstream schools also opened in September, this is all part of our commitment to invest £30 million in SEND and create almost 700 extra places across Leicestershire. The Department for Education recently announced that Bowman Academy, a new 50 place SEMH school, has been approved and is due to open in Shepshed in September 2023. The new school will be on the St Botolphs Primary School site - with the primary school due to be re-located to the adjacent Iveshead site the year before. A consultation is currently underway to seek views on this proposal (https:// www.leicestershire.gov.uk/haveyour-say/current-consultations/ shepshed-schools-campuschanges-have-your-say).

Selected mainstream schools in towns such as Shepshed, Loughborough, Hinckley and, Syston are also either having existing space refurbished, or extensions built. Thorpe Acre Junior school in Loughborough, for example, has been extended to



provide a special unit for pupils with communication and interaction needs. Existing special schools, such as Maplewell Hall in Woodhouse Eaves, have also been extended to offer new communication and interaction and post 16 specialist provisions.

Councillor Deborah Taylor, cabinet member for children and families, said:

"We are extremely pleased that everything is progressing really well and that we are seeing more places opening up across Leicestershire, more will follow in the future. We recognise the growing need for specialised placements and are committed to meet the demand as best we can.

"We are aware that there are children and young people currently supported some way from where they live and we're working hard to open more specialist schools and units across Leicestershire to place these young people closer to home."

New format for Education Health and Care Plans

As a result of our own moderation and the OFSTED inspection in February we have a dedicated workstream to further develop the quality of our Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCP). The key areas of development have been looking at pupil voice, co-production across services such as Health and Social Care, outcomes being specific, and plans being kept up to date.

In terms of co-production, workshops to develop the new EHCP template have been held across other services including the Parent Carer Forum. Direct links to our Quality Assurance work has informed its development and the new look plans will be easier to understand, with clearer links between Needs, Outcomes and Provision, detailing who is responsible for that provision The new EHCP format will also more directly reflect the child/young person's views and their aspirations for the future.

Guidance is currently being developed for staff and advice givers, and training will draw upon specialist advice including what helps create a quality plan. The new EHCP template will be accompanied by new formats in the referral formal for an assessment for an EHCP from schools and the annual review form that schools complete. These are hoping to be rolled out throughout the term.

SEN Transport Update

For Home to School Transport especially transport for those with SEND these have been challenging times. In providing the service the Council has had to consider many changes and new safety requirements which have stretched the team to capacity. The team have had less than 6 weeks to complete a major task that normally takes six months and necessitated a higher level of scrutiny and management over particular routes and providers.

The team has overcome these difficulties in most instances, the vast majority of people now have their school transport for the school year, although we are conscious that some still don't. The team have now put in place transport for although that applied for SEN transport before the end of the academic year but there remain a few outstanding pupils who applied after that date but before the start of term, and the team will be using this half term to ensure these transport arrangements are put in place.

There just remains those who applied after the start of term, those who have requested a change to their transport arrangement due to a change in circumstances, along with the new applications that we are dealing with, some 10% from last year. We therefore have work to do for these groups which we will be pursuing after half term.

Help to protect yourself from infection and **prevent the spread of flu this winter**

GP practices across Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland have begun to contact vulnerable patients who meet the new national eligibility criteria to let them know how to access their flu jab this year.

And patients are being urged to take up the offer promptly and protect themselves against the flu this winter.

Dr Nil Sanganee, GP in Leicestershire said:

"With the added complication of covid-19 circulating at the same time, having the flu jab will help protect you and your families from being ill and help the NHS to better manage demand this winter.

"The flu virus typically peaks during the winter months and the best way to help protect yourself and others from catching and spreading flu is to have the flu jab every year. "Flu strains can change from year to year, which means last year's jab may not protect you from this year's strains. The vaccine usually provides protection for the duration of that year's flu season.

"Getting vaccinated is important each year but this year more than ever we are urging people to have the vaccine in order to protect themselves, and the NHS, this winter."

Children aged 2 and 3 years old, plus all primary school aged children and year 7 in secondary school, will be offered the nasal spray vaccination.

The adult flu vaccine is offered free to those in groups at particular risk of infection and complications from flu.

New plans revealed to improve SEND support in Leicestershire

Families have helped to shape new plans to strengthen the support for children and young people with Special Educational Needs (SEN) and Disabilities in Leicestershire.

Leicestershire County Council and Leicestershire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) have worked with schools, parents, carers and young people to draw up a Written Statement of Action following the inspection of the Local Area's SEND offer by OFTSED and the Care Quality Commission (CQC) that took place in February.

Improving the experience for children, young people, parents and carers who go through the process of assessment for and development of Education, Health and Care (EHC) Plans is a key focus of the changes.

Officer from across the service have worked very hard to develop a robust plan to make changes and drive forward improvements. Areas where improvements are already happening include EHC plan development and decision making panels.
