

Proposed changes to recycling and household waste sites

Public consultation survey results







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Chapter 1: Introduction & methodology

Leicestershire County Council continues to face financial challenges. The council has increasing demand for services and a growing population—this means having to find more savings in the future, despite having made £200 million worth of savings since 2010.

The council's current budget (announced in February 2019) included savings of £260,000 from Recycling and Household Waste Sites (RHWS). A significant amount of this saving is intended to come from the proposals outlined in this consultation.

The council provides 14 recycling and household waste sites across the county.

The current opening times for all sites are as follows:

- 9am—7pm, five days a week from April to September (Saturday to Wednesday or Thursday to Monday dependent on site);
- 9am—4pm, five days a week from October to March
- All sites are closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day

Our Proposals

The council proposes to reduce the daily RHWS opening hours to 9am to 5pm in the summer (April to September), whilst leaving winter hours the same. It is estimated that this proposal will save the council £134,000 across the existing thirteen sites by the end of 2020/21.

Overview of the process

The council has consulted with the public and organisations on the proposed changes to the opening times of Leicestershire County Council's recycling and household waste sites.

The consultation involved a survey with residents, non-residents, businesses and other stakeholders. This report presents the findings of the survey.

Survey

The survey was made available on the council website from 1 July to 23 September 2019. This was accompanied by an information booklet which set out the proposals in more detail.

The survey asked for views on the proposed changes to the opening times of our recycling and household waste sites, as well as asking about how people currently use the service (see Appendix 1 for the full questionnaire).

The consultation closed on the 23 September 2019 (12 weeks).

Communications and Media Activity

The council communicated the consultation in a number of ways, including:

- Press releases sent to local media when Cabinet discussed the issue (prior to consultation going live). In the final week of the consultation, coverage was widespread, including TV.
- Social media messages on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram throughout the consultation (on average a post every 3 days). There was much interaction with these posts from the public, including sharing and comments.
- On the local authority website consultation webpage.
- Information was sent to the parish councils via the parish councils newsletter.
- 'Adshell' posters (similar to posters at bus stops) at the RHWS sites and sites, staff handed out around 10,000 fliers. Fliers were also sent out with all new and renewed permit applications.
- Leaflets were available at several public talks and events at which waste service team/volunteers were present.
- There were also staff communications, including on the intranet.

Alternative Formats/ Equality and Human Rights Impact Assessment

The EHRIA screening process highlighted equalities considerations and steps were put in place to make the processes open and inclusive, and reduce any barriers to participation.

Posters were displayed at each recycling and household waste sites and fliers promoting the consultation were distributed to users at the sites if they requested them. These included details of how hard copies of the consultation documents could be obtained on request.

The council's Customer Services Centre were briefed on the consultation and were able to support any callers that requested information.

Whilst the survey was made easily accessible online, support and alternative formats of the survey were made available on request.

Response Rate

During the three month consultation window, 860 people responded to the survey.

There were 859 respondents that took part by completing the online survey, with 1 respondent returning a paper copy.

Chart 1 shows the capacity in which respondents completed the survey. The largest group of respondents were members of the public; the majority were residents of Leicestershire (95%), with a smaller proportion living outside of Leicestershire county (3%).

The remainder of the respondents were made up of: 16 public sector organisations, 2 businesses, 1 voluntary organisation/charity and 3 'Other'.

Analysis - methodology

Graphs and tables have been used to assist explanation and analysis. Although occasional anomalies appear due to rounding differences, these are never more than +/-1%. Question results have been reported based on those who provided a valid response, i.e. excluding the 'don't know' responses and no replies from the calculation of the percentages, in most instances.

Postcodes supplied by respondents (members of the public and businesses/ stakeholders) were used to assign geographical information, including lower-tier local authority, deprivation (IMD county quintile) rural-urban classification (RUC), and distance to nearest site.

Postcodes were also used to identify the distance that each respondent travelled to their nearest site.

Statistical Analysis

The questionnaire included a range of demographic questions. As well as allowing for the profile of respondents to be understood it also makes it possible to understand the views of different groups.

To maximise statistical reliability, demographic groups were aggregated where appropriate. The responses of different demographic groups were statistically compared using Chi-

Full results from Statistical Analysis can be found in Appendix 4.

Analysis of open-ended comments

The survey contained three open-ended questions. A total of 1,478 comments were left across these questions. All of the comments were read by analysts and reoccurring themes were identified. The comments provided were summarised and indicative quotes were used to provide a narrative.

The Waste Management Service will be given all comments received in full for further consideration.

Respondent profile

The demographic profile of those responding to the survey has been compared to the population figures from the 2011 Census. This analysis is reported in Appendix 2. It shows that the profile of respondents is somewhat different to the Leicestershire population. Certain demographic groups are overrepresented. For example, men, and those aged 45-84. BME respondents are underrepresented, particularly Asian or Asian British respondents, as are those with a long-standing illness or disability.

Postcode analysis shows a lower proportion of respondents were from Melton and Oadby and Wigston boroughs, compared to Census 2011 figures.

Chapter 2: Use of the recycling and household waste sites

Respondents were asked about their current usage of recycling and household waste sites.

Which recycling and household waste sites are used? (Q2)

Respondents were asked about their current usage of recycling and household waste sites.

The most popular site was Whetstone, which 23% of respondents said they used, followed by Mountsorrel (20%), Oadby (18%) and Loughborough (17%), as can be seen in Chart 2.


Statistical analysis shows that respondents who were significantly more likely to <u>use only one site</u> identified as Black or Minority Ethnic (BME), living in Melton or living under 2 miles from their nearest site.

In contrast, respondents who were more likely to <u>use two or more</u> <u>sites</u> were White, currently employed, living in Charnwood or North West Leicestershire, or living more than 2 miles away from their nearest site.

The Bottesford and Melton sites were more likely to be the only site a respondent uses.

The following sites were more likely to be one of several sites a respondent uses: Barwell, Coalville, Kibworth, Loughborough, Lount, Mountsorrel, Shepshed, Whetstone and Non-Leicestershire County Council sites.

Chart 3 - Site usage by district respondent lives (multiple response)



Chart 3 shows 48% of respondents who use the Whetstone site live in Blaby district. Therefore, 52% of people who use Whetstone come from outside of the district in which it is located, showing that the site has quite a broad catchment, compared to other sites.

How often sites are used (Q3)

Chart 4 shows that of those respondents who use one of our sites, just over a third (36%) visit 'about once a month' and just under a quarter (22%) visit about 'once every three months'.

Respondents who were significantly more likely to use one of our sites <u>about once a fortnight or more often</u> were: male (43%), aged 65 and over (48%), wholly retired from work (45%), living in Melton (47%) or in a rural town and fringe area (39%). They were also significantly more likely to live under 2 miles from their nearest site (35%) or use one site only (35%).

Respondents who were significantly more likely to use one of our sites <u>about once a month</u> were: female (40%) or living in a urban city and town areas (38%).

Respondents who were significantly more likely to use one of our sites <u>once every 3 months or less often</u> were: female (39%), aged 25-34 (46%), currently employed (36%), living in Hinckley and Bosworth (45%), or in a more deprived area of the county (46%). They were also significantly more likely to live between 2 and 5 miles away from their nearest site (40%).

Chart 5 shows that when compared with other sites, Bottesford was used more regularly and non-Leicestershire sites were used less often.

Distance to nearest site

Postcodes supplied by respondents were used to identify the distance that each respondent travelled to their nearest site.

The distances respondents travelled to their nearest site ranged between 0.4 miles and 27.3 miles. The average distance respondents travelled to their nearest site was 2.2 miles.

Respondents who were significantly more likely to travel <u>under 2</u> <u>miles</u> to their nearest site were: living in Charnwood, Melton, Oadby and Wigston or bordering authorities; living in a less deprived area or in an urban area. They were also significantly more likely to use 2 or more of our sites.

Respondents who were significantly more likely to travel <u>more than 2 miles</u>, <u>but less than 5 miles</u> were: living in Charnwood or in a rural area. They were also significantly more likely to use only one of our sites.


Respondents who were significantly more likely to travel <u>more than 5 miles</u> were: aged 25-44, living in Charnwood, Hinckley and Bosworth, Oadby and Wigston or bordering authorities, or in a rural area. They were also significantly more likely to use 2 or more of our sites.

Primary site used (Q4)

Chart 6 shows the responses to 'Which of our sites do you normally use?'

Mountsorrel (16%), Oadby (14%), Whetstone (13%) or Melton (12%) were the most frequently cited 'primary' sites.


Reasons for using primary site (Q5)

Chart 7 shows the reasons respondents provided, as to why they used their primary site; respondents were able to select more than one option.

The majority of respondents said they used this site most often because it was close to where they lived (94%).

Many respondents also mentioned that they used this site because it was easy to use or had a good layout (44%), it had convenient opening times (41%), and the staff were helpful and friendly (38%).

There were 15 respondents that said they used their normal site for 'other' reasons.

Some of these comments included: those who passed the site on their way to visit another destination; those who had a permit for that particular site and those who chose that site because of it's acceptance of a wide range of waste items.

Respondents who were significantly more likely to use their primary site because it was <u>close to where they lived</u> were: aged 25-44 (97%). They were also more likely to live under 2 miles away from their nearest site (98%) or use only one site (96%).

Respondents who were significantly more likely to use their primary site because it was <u>easy to use or had a good layout</u> were: wholly retired from work (51%) or living in Charnwood (51%).

Respondents who were significantly more likely to use their primary site because <u>staff were helpful and friendly</u> were: male (42%), aged 65 and over (54%), wholly retired from work (49%) or living within a rural town and fringe area (44%).

Times that sites are being used (Q6)

Respondents were asked when they tended to use their primary site during the week and at weekends (shown in Charts 8 and 9).

Respondents were allowed to choose more than one time.

Chart 8 shows that 62% of respondents said they used their primary site between 5-7pm on weekdays during the summer, with 25% using the site between 3-5pm.


Chart 9 shows that at the weekend, usage is more even across the day, with the hours of 9-10am (24%) and 12-1pm (22%) being quietest.

Respondents who were significantly more likely to use a site between 5-7pm during the week, were: aged 25-44 (76%) and currently employed (76%).

Respondents who reported that they had a long-standing disability or infirmity were significantly more likely to use the site <u>between the hours of 9-10am</u>, both during the week <u>and on a weekend</u>.


Respondents aged 65 and over and those wholly retired from work were significantly more likely to use the sites during the week, <u>between 10am-3pm rather than between 5-7pm</u>.

What times people use their primary site

The hours of 10am-12pm were a popular time for respondents who used Lutterworth and Bottesford. Mountsorrel, Shepshed and Whetstone were less popular between 12-1pm. Bottesford was a popular site in the evening.


Chapter 3: Our proposals

Affect of changing site opening hours (Q7)

Respondents were asked how a change in opening hours would affect their ability to use one of the sites.

Chart 12 shows that 27% of respondents said that changing the opening times would make it much more difficult for them to use one of the sites. In addition, 27% said it would make it somewhat more difficult and 45% said it would make little difference.

Respondents who were significantly more likely to say that it would make it <u>much more difficult</u> for them were: aged 25-44 (35%), from a BME background (45%) or currently employed (32%).

Respondents who were significantly more likely to say that it would <u>make it somewhat more difficult</u> for them were: currently employed (32%) or those who said they used two or more sites (33%).


Respondents who were significantly more likely to say that the change in those opening times would <u>make little</u> <u>difference</u> to them were: aged 65-74 (47%), who identified as white (47%), wholly retired from work (79%) or were living in Hinckley and Bosworth (58%).

Chart 13 shows how the proposed changes would affect the respondents that use different sites.

There were 96 respondents that said that <u>Melton</u> was their primary site, of which 38% felt that a change in opening times would make it much more difficult for them to visit the site.

Of the 115 respondents that said they primarily used <u>Oadby</u>, half said that the change in opening times would make little difference to them overall (50%).

Chart 13 - Affect of changing site opening hours by primary site used






Chart 14 shows that of the respondents who said they visited their primary site between 5-7pm <u>during the week</u>, 44% said a change in opening times would make it much more difficult for them to use a site. A large proportion of respondents who visited the sites at other times during the week (9am-5pm) said that a change in opening times would make little difference to them overall.

Chart 15 shows that of the respondents who said they visited their primary site between 5-7pm at the weekend, 42% said a change in opening times would make it much more difficult for them to use a site. Similar to Chart 14, a large proportion of respondents who visited the sites at other times at the weekend (9am-5pm) said a change in opening times would make little difference to them overall.

A follow up question 'Why did you say this?', provided respondents with the opportunity to explain why changing the opening times would affect them.

The majority of respondents who said reducing the opening hours to 9am—5pm would make it 'much more difficult' for them to use one of the sites, said it was because of their work commitments. Many added that reducing the opening hours would encourage flytipping; whilst others made further suggestions to adjust the opening hours to best suit those employed full-time. The following quotes were reflective of respondent's suggestions:

"I work 9-5pm myself so I would not be able to visit the site on a weekday. Therefore making it even busier on a weekend, when everyone else will also be visiting"

"Closing at 5pm would make it impossible for me to use the site during the working week. Whilst I would not do so, the early closing could encourage others to fly-tip"

"9-5 in the summer means that we wouldn't be able to take our waste/recycling to the centre after our working hours. I think this will mean a lot more queuing at the weekend, making the site less easy to use. I think if hours need to be cut, it would be better to cut them to either 10-6 or 11-7 in the summer, especially during the winter."

Alternatives to removing evening opening hours (Q8)

Respondents were asked, if they sometimes used a site in the evening, when they would choose to visit instead, following a change in opening hours.

Chart 16 shows that on weekdays, 54% of respondents said that if their primary site was closed in the evenings, they would not visit the site at all during the week. In this circumstance, of those who would choose an alternative time, 28% said they would visit between 3-5pm during the week.

Chart 16 - Alternative times to evening opening hours during the week (multiple response)




Chart 17 - Alternative times to evening opening hours at the weekend (multiple response)

When respondents were asked about visiting at an alternative time on a weekend, 52% said they would visit between 3-5pm, as shown in Chart 17.

When compared to during the week, fewer respondents said a change in opening times at the weekend would mean they would not visit at all at the weekend (13%).

There were 55 respondents (10%) who answered this question, who said they would not visit at all, during the week or at the weekend, if evening opening hours were removed.

Respondents who were significantly more likely to say that they would not visit the site at all <u>at the weekend</u> were: aged 65 and over (15%) or those that stated that they had a disability (14%). Further statistical comparisons can be found in Appendix 4.

Alternative times by primary site

Many respondents said that if their primary site was closed in the evenings, they would not visit the site at all during the week. Chart 18 shows this to be consistent across all sites. The hours of 3-5pm were popular for respondents as an alternative time to the evening opening hours.

Across all sites, the hours of 3-5pm were also popular for respondents as an alternative time to visit their primary site at the weekend. Fewer respondents said they would not visit at all at the weekend, when compared to those during the week.

Alternative suggestions for reducing running costs (Q9)

Respondents were asked whether there were any alternative options for reducing the running costs of the sites, that they thought the council should consider.

Many respondents felt the current proposal, of reducing the site opening times to 9am—5pm, does not pose a practical solution to saving costs. These comments primarily mentioned alternative opening times, particularly the suggestion of opening between 11am -7pm rather than 9am-5pm, which would allow residents in full-time employment the opportunity to access the site after work.

Some respondents suggested closing the smaller or less well used sites instead, whilst others suggested that different sites could alternate opening times and days to allow flexibility of access. Reducing the opening hours in the winter, rather than in the summer, was also a popular suggestion.

Related to this, many respondents were concerned that reducing opening times would encourage an increase in 'fly tipping', in turn increasing 'clean-up costs'. These comments highlighted some confusion around differentiating between county council and district council responsibilities.

Similarly, ideas concerning home/ kerbside recycling collections were often cited, including suggestions to collect more waste types and more regular collections throughout the summer. Some respondents also said they would like to see an increase in the number of smaller recycle facilities (e.g. bottle banks), more locally.

This further emphasises the confusion around different council responsibilities.

Many respondents proposed ideas related to 'upcycling' and selling unwanted items that had been deposited. Within these comments, respondents proposed turning certain waste into compost or energy; partnering with local companies that use recycled materials as part of their business strategies and opening 'upcycle' shops on sites.

Other respondents suggested reducing running costs based on schemes and ideas from other sites in different counties and countries. Several respondents suggested transforming the sites into 'smart sites', specifically making reference to presenting 'smart boards' at the entrance of each site, which would in turn reduce the number of staff needed—further reducing costs.

There were several comments which stated dissatisfaction with the council's proposal to reduce the running costs of sites and these respondents felt recycling and waste was an area that needed more investment, rather than less.

"I would suggest that they should be opened later in the day rather than closed early"

"You could have alternate days on 9-5 one 11-7, still reducing the hours open but giving more flexibility to people who work 9-5"

"I think it would be better to reduce the hours during the winter months rather than the summer as people will be doing DIY gardening etc."

"My concern is that there maybe an increase in fly tipping due to the reduced hours for the waste sites and the charging for currently free bulky collections"

"Have a small onsite area for selling on items that people have deposited"

"Linking up with commercial partners for recycling, i.e. companies that use recycled materials as part of their business strategy, both large companies and small niche companies. Allow them to access the materials that are being recycled or be actively involved"

"Increase brown bin collections to weekly during the summer months to decrease need for taking garden waste"

"More bottle banks and cardboard disposal sites locally"

"My Aunt lives in Hampshire. They have expanded their sites and run a secondhand shop which you can also buy gardening compost ..etc. ... Their investment has made the site hugely popular and reduced recycling, as more and more goods are upcycled"

"Pay as you throw scheme as they do in Europe"

"Have a smart board explaining the skip number to go to rather than a member of staff taking queries"

"To be honest, I think this is an area that needs more investment rather than less. Waste, particularly non-recyclable is a significant issue and should be a priority"

Other survey comments (Q10)

Respondents were asked if they had any other comments. By far the most frequent single comment mentioned by respondents was in relation to fly tipping. Residents were concerned that a proposed change in opening times would lead to an increase in fly tipping and hence produce additional costs for tax payers and the environment.

A large proportion of respondents felt the proposal to reduce the opening times would adversely affect those that work 9am-5pm. Many mentioned that this change may make the sites more congested at the weekends. Several respondents suggested that the council could alternate the opening days and times, or reduce the opening hours in the winter, rather than in the summer.

Other respondents shared their ideas of potential solutions to cut council costs, such as: opening up on-site shops to upcycle salvageable items; partnering up with the district/borough councils to increase roadside collections of household waste bins; and the restructure of staffing.

In contrast, there were some positive comments about individual sites and the current service provided. Some respondents said they understood the proposal and why reducing the opening times would cut costs effectively. A small number of respondents expressed concern that the proposed changes may impact the site staff and cause a reduction in their pay/ hours.

"I would urge you to consider a 5 day week, with one late night opening as this would appease most people"

"Reducing hours and also charging for bulky waste collections is asking for more illegal dumping of waste, when as a nation we should be encouraging people to recycle more and making it more accessible, not more restrictive"

"Evening opening on weekdays eases congestion at weekends. I forsee the RHWS being far busier at weekends"

"Cut the winter hours rather than the summer hours because everyone wants to take their garden rubbish in the summer"

"You can make money by selling on stuff in a tip shop as mentioned previously thus making money as opposed to making money/saving money by making cuts"

"Can't the county partner up with the boroughs to arrange more effective roadside collections? ...can't the councils work together to encourage / subsidise the roadside green bins and reduce the reliance on the waste site?"

"No, I understand that councils have to save money where they can. Oadby is an excellent site"

"Good idea to save money. Hopefully no one's job is affected too much"

Other consultation responses

In addition to the survey responses, the council received several other consultation responses (e.g. via letter and email).

The responses raised questions or concerns about the consultation's proposal; particularly with regards to how reducing the opening hours had the potential to increase fly tipping. Some made suggestions to open the sites at alternative times.

"My only fear of having limited tip opening hours is the increase in illegal fly tipping and all the additional costs associated with the clear up incurred by the Districts"

"I do take a lot of garden rubbish to the tip so this would affect me. Wouldn't it make more sense to open longer in the summer when people are taking garden rubbish and cut winter hours?"

"Due to work commitments surely you would be best to start later 11-till 7 so people that actually work can use in the week. And you would still save money"

"If the hours would be reduced something more flexible needs to be in place for residents. For example the site could be open 11am to 7pm."

Following an analysis of options, the proposal being put forward as being able to offer the best balance between how much money can be saved and the impact on our customers is to reduce the daily opening hours to 9am-5pm in the summer (currently 9am-7pm from April to September), whilst leaving winter hours the same. We estimate that this proposal would save the council £134,000 per year by the end of 2020/21.

An additional £2,000 will be saved from:

- Expanding the existing permit scheme to include commercial-style fridges/freezers and ammonia fridges.
- Setting up a chargeable service for non-household wastes that are currently not accepted at the RHWS e.g. car tyres and hazardous wood such as railway sleepers.

Appendix 3 - Geodemographic classifications

Urban Rural Classification


The Urban Rural Classification provides a methodology to classify the 2,085 Census Output Areas of Leicestershire according to their rurality.


The Definition adopts a settlement-based approach, comprising four settlement types, of which three are rural:

Appendix 4 - Statistical testing by demographics

How to read these tables

These tables allow you to statistically compare a response by a specific demographic group against the overall respondent sample. The statistical test used to identify statistical significance is called chi-square.

Statistical significance using chi-square tests is determined by looking at the difference between the expected and observed proportion of respondents. For example, if 50% of the whole sample said 'agree' for a given question, the expected proportion of any demographic (e.g. males) saying 'agree' is 50%. The expected proportion is then compared to the actual/observed proportion of the demographic who said 'agree', and measure of statistical significance is calculated.

To maximise statistical reliability, responses were aggregated where appropriate. For example, Matrix 2 displays the statistical analysis for Question 3. Responses were aggregated into: 'Once a fortnight or more' (= 'More than once a week', 'About once a week' and 'About once a fortnight') and 'Use once every 3 months or less often' = ('Once every 3 months', 'Once every 6 months', About once a year' and 'Less often').


