Mum and Mummy love being your parents. You have lots of happy times together like days out and holidays. They love you very much and always want you to be happy.



Children join their families in all sorts of different ways; some children live with their birth parents like you, some children live with their Grandma's, or Auntie's, or Uncle's and some children live with a family that is different to their own.

This includes when families become a Foster Family for children.



We can give you everything you need!

Foster Families are special because they take care of children in their home and make sure they have everything they need.

Children go to live with Foster Families for lots of different reasons including when their birth family hasn't kept them safe or given them everything they need.


Children can stay with Foster Families for a short time or a long time depending on when a decision is made about where the best place would be for them to live as they grow up.

Some children always live with Foster Families, some children are found a 'Just Right' family to live with and some children return to live with their birth families.



Mum and Mummy have been thinking about fostering for some time and whether you and them could be a child's foster family.

Mum and Mummy's job will be to give a child somewhere safe to stay and give them everything they need like food, clothes and affection. They will help them to see their family safely and explain to them why and what decisions have been made. If you want to you'll be able to help them too, especially by playing with them!





To be a child's foster family, Social Workers must do an assessment of the adults in the house. They also talk to any children that live with them. This is so they can carefully find the child that they think will best suit their family and make sure everyone feels happy.

Foster families each have their own Social Worker who visits them regularly and checks the family are ok. You will be able to talk to them about any worries you might have.


If it is agreed about being a foster family, Mum and Mummy will keep checking in with you and make sure you are ok. Things may be different at first, but they will be there for you.

They understand the idea of bringing someone new into the family might be scary and you might be worried about how life will change. You will still get to do all the things that you love!



There are lots of other birth children who are part of Foster Families and you might find it helpful to meet some of them.

Social Workers run a scheme called 'Sons and Daughters' where you can meet other children and they hold lots of different events you might want to join in with like craft days and picnics.





It's ok to feel different things and have lots of questions about fostering. You can ask Mum and Mummy anything you want and if they don't know they can ask the Social Workers.

Mum and Mummy will be able to talk to you more about this; they will always make sure they still have time for you. They love you so much!
