Direct Payment Card

Due to the developing Coronavirus pandemic during 2020, we worked with stakeholders to develop a new way to offer short breaks to families in Leicestershire. Parent carers who qualified for a summer playscheme during 2020 were issued with a direct payment card due to providers being unable to support families in their usual way. The direct payment card was an allowance of £250 which could be used flexibly and creatively in whichever way best met their child's needs.

We had some great feedback from the initiative – we asked parent carers "What, if anything, did your child like about the things that the summer direct payment card enabled them to do?" here are a few of their responses:

Allowed us to have a family break and spend quality time as a family. We had been shielding and are continuing to do so. This time was very valuable

She liked the gazebo as it enabled us to spend much more time outside and she loves being outside. We were able to sit outside and do crafts and play with the interactive toys that we got for her

Enabled our son to have a say in what resources he would like to have & therefore keep him entertained & involved with what he chose. Also factor in that we would take him to shops to purchase said resources enabled him to be part of wider society, use basic maths, and encouraged him to talk to shop staff, asking for assistance/ help!! A great idea ! Some examples of how they were used includes:

- A paddling pool
- Portable DVD Player
- Audio stories
- To pay additional hours for child's personal assistant

What could we have done differently?

Difficult under the circumstances but if it is intended to be used again perhaps issued a little earlier to allow parents/ carers to plan a holiday. Many adapted holidays are booked in advance

Making the balance easier to view and manage transactions better.

Maybe give out more information of how and what resources are out there.

SENA service update

As part of the work we are doing in developing the quality of the SENA Service, we have reviewed all of the processes followed in SENA and any accompanying documentation. As you know, the Service has been restructured with the aim of developing a better service to ensure better outcomes for our children and young people with SEND.

- Examples of some of the developments are:
- We are quality assuring the samples of plans and are working with a variety of services to ensure 'better' advice with SMART outcomes.
- We have developed new formats that will help us gain information and share information better.
- We have designed a new format of EHCP with much clearer links between need, provision and outcomes.
- We have designed a new referral for assessment template to ensure we collect more information about the c/yp
- We have designed a new Annual Review form that will inform any amendments required
- We have also designed a new Request for Information form for our advice givers

Part of our examination of the 'effective use of funding' we as a local authority are doing, has related to both EHCP's (Education, Health and Care Plan) and Top-Up funding. For some schools we recognise that navigating through the system can be difficult and that some may have faced a delay in response time.

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Our aim:

To develop a transparent, consistent and timely process that provides the most appropriate funding stream to support the child or young person. We are looking at a variety of models long term to provide Top Up funding for schools. We will engage with schools and other stakeholders when appropriate to do so.

We recognise that funding can be used to support focused intervention which can narrow the gap between the c/yp and their peers which can in turn prevent a long term need which is likely to have impact adulthood.

To address confusion over terminology of what Top Up funding is, as nationally this covers all Element 3 funding we are changing this process of support to **SEND Intervention Funding**. As part of this process we doing the following:

- Develop clear guidance for schools
- Change process to ensure timely response
- Change request application to provide greater clarity in the intervention required and the expected outcomes
- Ensure schools fully cost out interventions and demonstrate how the funding will be spent.

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SENA changes

The Special Educational Needs Assessment and Commissioning Service (SENA) carry out statutory assessments and reviews of children and young people who have an EHCP from age 0 – 25.

The service is responsible for writing Education Health and Care Plans (EHCP) if a statutory assessment is agreed and will commission the relevant provision to meet needs of the child or young person. The service can provide advice and guidance to families as well as educational settings around statutory duties.

SENA oversee and maintain more than 5200 EHCP's (Nov 2020), considering around 80 new needs assessments per month.

At the beginning of May 2021, the service launched a new structure which has been split into localities.

- Locality A Melton, Market Harborough, Oadby, Wigston and Blaby
- Locality B Loughborough, Coalville, Birstall and Quorn
- Locality C Anstey, Groby, Hinckley, Bosworth, Lutterworth and Enderby

Each locality will be made up of a Team Manager, Senior Practitioner and a number of caseworkers.

Surgeries available for SENA Service

In order to provide the best possible service, SENA are introducing regular 'surgery' times where there will be dedicated staff to respond to enquiries. Surgeries will take place twice a week on a Tuesday afternoon 1-5pm and Thursday morning 9am-1pm. During these times, there will be locality case managers and senior managers available to take calls and manage the mailbox.

Outside of these hours, phones may be connected to an automated response providing customer information and the opportunity to leave a recorded message. This will enable the majority of staff to focus on case work, writing plans and responding to annual reviews. We believe that introducing surgeries will help us to be as efficient as possible whilst keeping to our customer standards of responding to calls within 3 working days.

A new SEND unit opened at Thistly Meadow primary school in Blaby.

Thistly Meadow primary school has partnered with Birkett House special school to open a new unit for 12 children as part of the school's expansion.

The purpose-built classroom, which was built by Leicestershire County Council, welcomed its first pupils last term. The unit will be run by Birkett House staff but will be part of the Thistly Meadow school community enabling SEND pupils to access learning in a mainstream setting.

Deborah Taylor, cabinet member for Children and Family Services, said:

"This special unit is part of the council's commitment to invest £30 million in SEND and create almost 700 extra places within Leicestershire.

"The programme aims to promote stronger inclusion in all schools, to ensure that pupils with SEND may be educated as close to home as possible and in the community where they live to help promote continuity and progression into adulthood."

Colin Bowpitt, Head teacher of Thistly Meadow said,

"We were excited about this project from the very start; as an inclusive school, we share the same ethos and ideals and see huge benefits to children from both schools being on the same site".

Chris White, Head teacher of Birkett House said,

"We have a long tradition of working with mainstream partners to deliver genuinely inclusive links for our pupils. We are delighted at this opportunity to work in collaboration with Thistly Meadow to improve both educational and social outcomes for our pupils."

Have your say on new school term date options

We have launched a consultation to capture people's views on three options for future term dates for Leicestershire.

The proposals cover term dates running for five years from autumn 2022 to summer 2027 and include:

- Keeping the 'traditional' county term time pattern, which offers an earlier summer holiday but means a longer autumn term
- Aligning the autumn and spring breaks in line with most other authorities, including Leicester City, but again means a longer autumn term

 Introducing a two-week autumn half-term break. This would leave terms 'more balanced' across the whole year but would result in a shorter Easter break

Both authorities' proposals reflect the same dates and we're both asking for views on whether the term patterns followed by the city and county should match. The closing date for both consultations is **midnight** on **Sunday, July 18, 2021.**

Specialist Foster Carer roles are full-time and well-paid. You'll have access to comprehensive training and 24/7 support, as well as the opportunity to go the extra mile and give a child or young person your full attention and the expert care they need. Children in care may have additional or complex needs, including a physical disability, severe learning disability or sensory impairment, autism or other health need. For some, their emotional state means full-time intensive care is required. They may have struggled in education

or with building relationships. Could you be their advocate and foster carer?
