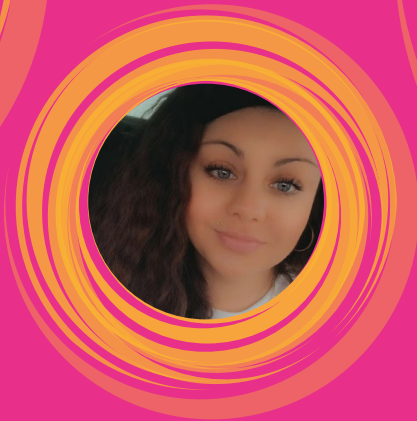

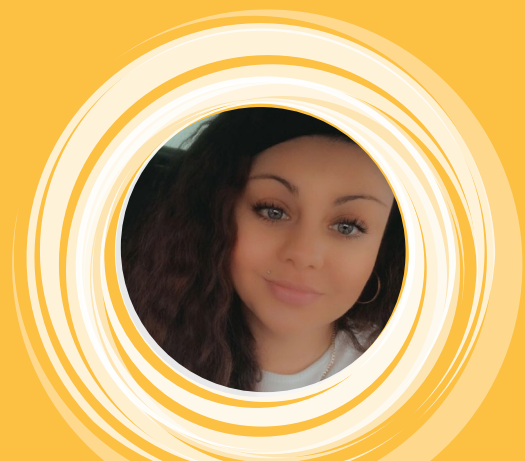
Young Volunteer category 2016

History of the Office of Lord-Lieutenant

The Lord-Lieutenant is the official representative of Her Majesty The Queen for the County and City of Leicester. The Office of Lord-Lieutenant is military in origin and can be said to date from the reign of Henry VIII. Until 1921 the Lord-Lieutenant still had the power to call on all able-bodied men of the County to fight in the case of need.

The traditional links with the military have been preserved in a modern form by the involvement of the Lord-Lieutenant with the Reserve Forces and Cadets Association, which embraces the Territorial Forces and the Cadet Corps. The Lord-Lieutenant also maintains connections with the uniformed civilian organisations, such as the Police, Fire and Ambulance services and many voluntary bodies, such as Red Cross, St. John and national and local youth organisations. Each year Mr Kapur appoints five young cadets to support him on ceremonial occasions.

Leicestershire's first Lord-Lieutenant, Henry Grey, 3rd Marquis of Dorset KG, was appointed in 1549. Upon the death of Edward VI he attempted to place his eldest daughter, Lady Jane Grey, upon the throne. This attempt failed and he was captured at Astley and was beheaded on Tower Hill on 23rd February 1554. The remains of the Grey's home can still be found in Bradgate Park.

Nominate your Young Person of the Year 2022

The Lord-Lieutenant's Award for Young People focuses on four key themes and nominations will need to demonstrate that the young person has made a contribution to society which meets the criteria set out below.

CATEGORY

1

Young Braveheart of the Year

Awarded to an individual who has:

- overcome personal barriers to achieve success
- made a stand against bullying, racism etc.
- demonstrated a life-saving act of bravery

CATEGORY

2

Young Volunteer of the Year

Awarded to an individual who has:

- enhanced their local community or environment
- cared for a neighbour or relative in need
- helped run a community or sports based club or society

CATEGORY

3

Young Leader of the Year

Awarded to an individual who has:

- motivated and inspired those around them by leading a project or a change for the better
- led a team or group to success, overcoming obstacles and bringing people together
- shown commitment, promise and determination

CATEGORY

4

Young Artist of the Year The Joe Humphries Memorial Award



Awarded to a young person who demonstrates real skill, innovation, and expression in:

- visual arts
- expressive arts
- literature, or
- music

Joe was a talented young person with a passion for the arts. Joe passed away unexpectedly in 2012 with SADS (Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome). Visit www.jhmt.org.uk to learn more.

Special Achievement Award

CATEGORY

5

The award will recognise those who:

- have shown great strength and enthusiasm in response to the outbreak of the Coronavirus
- have gone out of their way to help those around them and the vulnerable.
- have used their imagination and creativity to keep the spirits up of those around them
