Vital help for families struggling with cost of living

Families across Leicestershire are feeling the impact of cost of living increases - and from energy costs to food vouchers, we're doing everything we can to help.

And this summer, there will be more support for people through the Household Support Fund.

The council-administered scheme will run until the end of September and offer vulnerable pensioners and families vouchers to help with fuel and food costs.

The £3.6 million fund will also pay for food vouchers for around 14,000 children who are eligible for free school meals, during the six-week summer holiday.

From August, we're planning one-off £100 payments for people in receipt of pension credit. More information about how to obtain this will be available soon.

Free places will also be available at holiday clubs over the summer for children eligible for free school meals.

We're able to offer these as part of the Government's Holiday Activities and Food programme, backed by footballer Marcus Rashford.

The free sessions include sports, music, arts and other exciting opportunities to learn and develop skills, alongside a nutritious meal each day.

In Wigston, Coalville, Loughborough and Hinckley, our volunteer-run 'community fridges' are continuing to support their local communities by

providing donated food for free to anyone who needs it.

We're providing people in hardship with furniture and electrical goods, plus emergency food and fuel support, and funding Citizens Advice to help them offer vital support. At the moment, this includes an extra £250.000 to bolster money and debt advice.

And by teaming up with district councils, we're securing money to install energy efficiency measures in those homes most in need of support. This means that over the next year, more than £3 million will be spent making Leicestershire's homes warmer, and tackling the crucial issue of rising energy prices.

Deputy council leader, Deborah Taylor,



said: "Rising costs are impacting families so we're stepping up and making help available. "And with over £3 million

being invested in energy

Making the county **net zero**

We've launched a major consultation on making Leicestershire a net zero county – and we need your help.

We want to hear what you think about our wideranging action plan which includes every day steps that can help us all reduce our carbon emissions and help protect the environment. Running until late July, our consultation focuses on:

- Reducing carbon emissions generated by transport
- Reducing energy use in buildings plus improving energy efficiency and renewable energy generation
- Supporting businesses to go green and grow the low-carbon economy
- Supporting communities to tackle climate change
- Increasing the removal and storage of carbon in natural systems like soil and forests



Councillor Blake Pain, cabinet member for the environment and the green agenda, said: "We're a green council. That's why we're consulting on our draft strategy and action plan, and joining forces with residents,

councils, businesses, universities and others in the race to net zero.

"We can't tackle these challenges alone. Everyone in the county has a part to play in helping us to get to net zero by 2045.

"We can make a big difference and I would urge people to get involved. By having your say, you'll be shaping a cleaner, greener and healthier Leicestershire for future generations."

Illegal cigarettes seized

Leicestershire's Trading Standards Service has seized and destroyed tens of thousands of illegally imported cigarettes and packs of hand rolling tobacco which would have been sold in county shops. A specialist recycling company has disposed of the items. The tobacco became mulch used by landscapers and the cigarette plastic filters were shredded and put into concrete products.

Full steam ahead for freeport

Plans to create an innovative, inland freeport are on track. The County Council is what is known as the accountable body for the East Midlands Freeport, which is on schedule to become fully operational later this year. It is expected to create around 61,000 new jobs and generate £8.9 billion for the economy over the next 30 years, playing a critical role in levelling up the region. Visit emfreeport.com

Thousands of children have secured a place at their preferred primary school this September. A total of 98 per cent have been offered a place at one of their top three school choices after we received 7,410 applications. Ninety-three per cent of youngsters have secured a place at their first-choice school, with four per cent being offered their second option and just under one per cent their third. You can apply for 2023 reception places from 1 September.

FSX **connect**

With public transport still recovering from the effects of Covid-19, we're exploring a fresh approach designed to better connect rural areas.

Later in the summer, three fully-accessible minibuses will be available to book through an app or by calling a contact centre, offering a modern, on-demand transport service between Leicester and Hinckley.

FoxConnect is a three-year trial, funded through our successful bid for £1.3 million from the Government's Rural Mobility Fund.

Operating within a designated area, it will include direct journeys to major employment sites such as Carlton Park, Next at Enderby and Fosse Park. It will also open up further travel options for villages including Stoney Stanton, Broughton Astley, Whetstone and Huncote.

The move comes as the bus industry emerges from the pandemic, during which it has had to survive on emergency support from Government and councils.

Our local bus network is run almost entirely by the commercial sector, limiting our influence. Unfortunately, along with many other councils, our bid for Government cash to boost the industry locally was turned down, but we're working with operators to see if we can secure future funding.



Councillor Ozzy O'Shea, cabinet member for highways and transport, said: "This is an innovative approach and it's something I'm really excited about.

Ozzy O'Shea "We have to do all we can to get people back on to

public transport or we face a 'use it or lose it' scenario. If the trial works well, we want to roll it out in other areas as and when funding becomes available."

Wildflower verges take root

A clever initiative – which transforms roadside verges within towns and villages into wildflower areas – is continuing to bloom.

The project, a partnership with local wildlife charity NatureSpot, aims to boost biodiversity and wildlife by leaving wildflowers to flourish on urban roadside verges across Leicestershire.

More than 50 parishes have now signed up to the scheme, which involves volunteers and parishes giving their time to restore the verges, including the sowing of native wildflower seeds, and learning about the local wildlife within these important habitats.

We now have our highest number of designated wildflower verges – over 70 in total – which is more than the size of two standard football pitches.

Councillor Blake Pain, cabinet member for the environment and the green agenda, said: "We're playing our part in replacing the lost wildflower meadows of the past century and the response from parishes has been great. "Conserving our natural environment is a really important part of the council's work as we play our part in tackling climate change and encouraging others to join us."

"Other factors, including national reform of special educational needs and health support, ongoing recruitment challenges and the impact of Covid, are turning the screw on our already extremely stretched resources.

"This makes our campaign to get a fairer funding deal from Government even more important. And with the newly-formed F20 group of low-funded councils, we're teaming up to call for a £300 million temporary fix to level up local government finance. And as we negotiate with the Government over a County Deal, we're doing everything we can to lever more money and local powers for Leicestershire."

Supercharging broadband

Gigabit broadband is the future – and we're working to roll it out to communities across Leicestershire.

We're working with Building Digital UK on the exciting initiative which will involve creating around 50 hubs in rural areas – including schools, libraries, recycling centres and offices.

The project is expected to be completed by 2024 and once these sites have been upgraded, the surrounding community will then be able to benefit. They can then sign up to community fibre voucher schemes with local suppliers to bring Gigabit-capable broadband to more properties.

Gigabit broadband is the fastest connection currently available and this project will help the Government connect at least 85 per cent of premises by 2025.

Keeping services on track

It's important key decisions and services are challenged – and that's the role of our scrutiny committees.

Over the last 12 months, the Scrutiny Commission and five other cross-party scrutiny committees have looked at over 120 reports, on issues ranging from four-year budget plans, care pressures, road casualties and inclusion in schools to tackling climate change and mental health. Over half of our councillors deal with scrutiny issues.

Budget – With the pandemic posing many challenges, our Scrutiny Commission took a fine-tooth comb to our four-year plan. Concerns were raised about the rising cost of special educational needs and disability support, as well as the impact of inflation and the costs of funding key infrastructure needed for a growing county.

Care home quality – Given the impact of the pandemic on care homes, our councillors were keen to look at the effect on care quality and on staff. As a result, they will now receive regular updates on care home ratings and they supported a review of care home fees in the spring.

▶ Mental health – Our Health Scrutiny Committee has taken an interest in mental health issues, both generally, and in relation to the pandemic. As well as seeking and receiving assurance that high-risk groups were being supported and known suicide locations were being monitored, they reviewed the options available to a patient at a time of crisis. They also heard about support available to members of the Armed Forces and veterans.

What's next? – On top of budget plans and a wide range of key health issues, scrutiny leads will also focus on new homes plans, learning disability support, home-schooling, river water quality, cancer screening backlogs and special educational needs transport.

The homes of elderly and vulnerable adults in Leicestershire are being fitted with equipment that detects falls and other risks inside and outside the home to help keep them safe 24-hours-a-day.

This technology provides residents. their carers. family and friends with the reassurance that help is available round-the-clock, seven days a week.

It allows people to be monitored by trained staff in case they should fall ill or have an accident so help can be quickly summoned, while reducing the pressure on 999 services.

Rebuilding people's lives

We're playing our part in helping those leaving Ukraine

Families and children fleeing the war in Ukraine have been arriving in Leicestershire - and we're playing our part in helping them rebuild their lives.

We are currently aware of up to 950 people expected to settle in Leicestershire under the Government's 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme.

We've teamed up with district councils, the NHS, police, East Midlands Airport and other partners to provide vital support and a safe place to live.

Help is available at a welcome point at East Midlands Airport from the moment people step off the plane.

Partners are working together to make sure refugees have access to vital services and support including accommodation, safeguarding, healthcare, education, translation, transport and employment, with us taking a lead on welfare and safeguarding checks.

Grants to help transform lives

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for community projects which help disadvantaged and vulnerable people in Leicestershire.

Our SHIRE Community Grants Scheme has a total budget of £600,000, to support projects run by community groups, charities, not-for-profit enterprises and town and parish councils.

We want to support schemes that help older people, those with disabilities, special educational needs or mental health conditions as well as carers and those experiencing financial hardship, social isolation and poor access to services.

Small grants of up to £3,000 or larger

sums of up to £10,000 are available to help with costs including staffing, buying equipment and room hire.



Councillor Pam Posnett, cabinet lead member for communities, said: "We know there are many great organisations doing fantastic work to support their

communities, often with limited resources.

"The cost of living crisis is really biting and that means more and more people are turning to community groups for help. "That's why we have been offering extra support this summer and there will be more funding to be handed out in the autumn."
