

## Leicestershire County Council Supporting Information Guide

These are the main points that should be considered when producing a supporting statement

<b>What are you proposing to develop</b> (description of elements of proposal, working, construction, restoration, afteruse)	
<b>Need of the proposal</b> (justification of the proposed development)	
<b>History of the site</b> (provide details of previous planning permission / operations on site)	
<b>Existing situation / operation / characteristics</b>	
<b>Are there any ancillary development</b>	
<b>Duration of operations</b> (timescales and working hours)	
<b>Environmental impacts</b> (noise, dust, odour, landscaping, transport, access, rights of way, TPO's, geology, hydrology, drainage, archaeology, ecology, lighting, agricultural)	
<b>Design implications</b>	
<b>Employment implications</b>	
<b>Alternatives solutions</b>	
<b>Mitigation measures</b>	
<b>Type of plant / machinery</b>	
<b>National, Regional and Local Planning Policies</b>	
<b>Is the proposal contrary to the Development Plan</b> (this should be made clear when submitting the application)	
<b>Planning Applications which meet the criteria with Annexes C and E of PPS25 will require a Flood Risk Assessment</b>	
<b>Waste</b> (type of waste to be managed, annual throughput, capacity of the site, management of leachate, recycling, reuse, waste hierarchy)	
<b>Minerals</b> (type of material to be extracted, landbank, apportionment figures, extraction rate, depth, existing sources of mineral in the area)
